

Their two programs, A+ College Ready and the Alabama Best Practices Center, build the capacity of teachers and school leaders. The program takes a two-generation approach by providing a consistent, structured school year for the students and weekly classes for their parents. Chisholm Trail Elementary's teachers and staff are dedicated and ready to support students in becoming responsible and productive difference makers in their communities. They encourage students to have a growth mindset as they learn both academic and social-emotional skills. The school is under the Belton Educational Enrichment Foundation which is an independent, nonprofit corporation established by the Friends of Belton Independent School District.

Bell Center for Early Intervention is dedicated to maximizing the potential of children from birth to three years of age who are at risk for developmental delay. The Bell Center provides quality early intervention services and is the only center-based program in Alabama. They promote growth in: gross and fine motor skills, language, cognition, self-help, and social skills. Children come from throughout central Alabama with a wide variety of special needs and diagnoses ranging from cerebral palsy and down syndrome to autism and rare genetic disorders.

The Alzheimer's Association Greater Indiana provides services in 73 Indiana counties. Indiana is home to 110,000 Hoosiers living with Alzheimer's disease and 216,000 unpaid Indiana caregivers. Their mission is to eliminate Alzheimer's disease through the advancement of research; to provide and enhance care and support for all affected; and to reduce the risk of dementia through the promotion of brain health. Their vision is a world without Alzheimer's and all other dementia.

Parkinson Association of Alabama seeks to improve the quality of life for patients, caregivers, and families affected by Parkinson's Disease. Textron Aviation Special Olympics Airlift operates because of aircraft owners and operators who donate the use of their aircraft, fuel, and pilots to transport Special Olympic athletes and coaches to the Special Olympics USA Games. They are able to transport thousands of athletes and their coaches from across the country to this event. A Textron Aviation aircraft takes off or lands every two minutes as a part of this effort.

Boys & Girls Club of Oshkosh strives to be a generation-changing leading provider of programs emphasizing youth development services and family outreach support to meet the needs of young people ages 6 to 18 years old. Their mission is to improve the lives of children and their families.

Salvation Army Angel Tree Program relies on social service agencies and schools to refer families to The Salvation Army for help with Christmas presents. They obtain the name of each child under 12 in the family and a list of desired Christmas gifts. Angel tags are printed for each individual and placed on Salvation Army Angel Trees in local companies and organizations. Donors select Angels, purchase gifts, and return them to the Angel Tree by the given deadline on each tag. The gifts are then taken to a Salvation Army Christmas Distribution Center for pickup by the Angel families.



SOCIAL SERVICES



Kansas Food Bank is a nonprofit whose mission is to provide comprehensive and compassionate hunger care whenever and wherever needed to safeguard the health, well-being, and productivity of food-insecure Kansas families and their children, senior citizens, the homeless, and the chronically ill. They are a member of Feeding America that distributes over 17 million pounds of food each year. Each year 215,000 people rely on their network to provide them meals.

Exceptional Foundation, founded in 1993, serves individuals with special needs in the Greater Birmingham area by targeting social and recreational objectives not met by educational institutions or the community at large. The Exceptional Foundation currently serves over 700 individuals with special needs annually and provides year round social and recreational services for individuals from ages 5 to 81.

Mustard Seed Ranch is a community-supported, interdenominational Christian ministry designed to take children out of unsafe environments and into loving, nurturing homes. Out of the social, emotional, intellectual, and spiritual support each child receives, seeds of hope begin to take root. In time, each child becomes empowered to overcome limiting cycles of behavior and replace them with an understanding of God's abundant purpose for their life.

Qualifications for Assistance

The need for assistance must stem directly from:

- A natural disaster, such as a devastating flood, ice storm, hurricane, tornado, or fire
- A short-term personal emergency like a house/apartment fire or flood resulting in a loss of basic needs such as food, clothing, or shelter
- A catastrophic event such as the death of an employee or family member or sudden illness or injury that causes an unforeseen financial circumstance

Awards of assistance will be made based on financial need and the severity and impact of the disaster on the named applicant and his or her family. Employees must have a minimum of 90 days of service with the company in order to be eligible for assistance. Supporting documentation and signatures will be required.

Donations

This fund is a 501(c)3 organization, and it is supported by monetary gifts from the company and our employees. A critical component of the fund is to be assured that there will always be money available whenever disaster strikes. Employees may make a one-time donation, or we are allowing **employee payroll deduction** - you may contact Human Resources Partner to sign up for payroll deductions to make contributions each pay period. You may not designate a specific party to be the recipient of the funds that you donate – all distribution decisions are made by the employee committee.
